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US Army's Virtual Simulation Training

The U.S. Army will soon be fielding the first-ever, full virtual simulation training program for US Soldiers, according to Intelligent Decisions, Inc. The new Dismounted Soldier Training System will enable US Army Soldiers to train in a virtual environment while at the same time reducing traditional training expenses. The Dismounted Soldier Training System uses CryENGINE

technology to provide photorealistic graphics and technology that will enable soldiers to virtually interact with their physical environment and to use combat equipment such as weapons, scopes and munitions. The system will allow Soldiers to use complex motion maneuvers, such as using arm and hand signals to communicate with others linked



into the system. The cutting-edge graphics provide a high degree of detail, including footprints, disturbed soil and grass, rolling terrain, dense vegetation, precipitation, light scattering, wind and storm effects. And a 360 degree sound system provides dynamic sounds, including battle noise and munitions impacts that Soldiers can use to determine such parameters as types, locations and distances.

The Effectiveness of Acupuncture on Pain and Mobility in Patients With Osteoarthritis of the Knee: A Pilot Study

Acupuncture has been repeatedly reported to relieve pain associated with osteoarthritis of the knee. As the vast majority of information on the effectiveness of acupuncture on this condition is based on data collected in Western countries, little is known about patients with osteoarthritis of the knee in Asian countries. In this pilot clinical study, acupuncture was incorporated into the standard care for adult patients with osteoarthritis of the knee to determine its contribution to pain relief and improved mobility. In a prospective, non-randomized controlled study, patients with osteoarthritis of the knee were separated into two groups. The first (the experimental group; n = 12) was scheduled for up to 8 sessions of acupuncture in addition to standard care, while the second (the control group; n = 12) received standard care only. Measurements using the six-minute walking distance test, pain visual analogue scale, and osteoarthritis of the knee outcome measurement were taken at baseline and after 4 weeks. Both study and control groups showed significant improvement with respect to time effects in terms of six-minute walking distance, pain visual analogue scale, pain domain and mobility domain scores determined by the osteoarthritis of the knee outcome measurement (p < .01), after adjusting for co variables. Pat Riley Expects Better Days Ahead for Heat

Speaking Tuesday, more than a week after the Heat season ended with a loss to the **Dallas Mavericks** in the NBA finals. Miami's team president said that not winning the title was a disappointment - but insisted the season still had plenty of successes.

"I'll say it. I'm not afraid to say it," Riley said at his annual end-of-season availability. "We are going to be multiple contenders, OK? I have no problem saying that. We will contend. That's all it's about. When you have a team that can contend for a championship, that's what you want, because then you have a shot at winning. "I know what everybody expected here, but it didn't happen," Riley added. "But we had a great season."

Riley said the team would add more pieces to complement LeBron James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh next season, plus was looking forward to seeing what can happen with a healthy Udonis Haslem and Mike Miller, both of whom had their 2010-11 campaign marred by iniuries.



He also said Erik Spoelstra would coach, shooting down any notion that the Hall of Famer was considering a return to the bench.

"No, I'm not going to," Riley said.

Riley ended his Hall of Fame coaching career in 2008, before tapping Spoelstra as his replacement.

Spoelstra has a 148-98 record in three regular seasons, along with a 18-15 mark in postseason play.

"It doesn't mean that I don't have the fire," Riley said. "But we have a great young coach here and I want to support him and hope that he can grow like I did. This is just his third year."

Riley said he expects Miami's so-called "Big 3" to get better during the offseason as well, noting that Bosh will likely add some bulk in the weight room and that James wants to do more to round out his game, which has already earned him two MVP awards.

"He's the most unique player in the NBA and we're blessed to have him," Riley said of James, adding that too much of the criticism for the team's loss to Dallas in the NBA finals went his way. Riley called the way last summer went, when he helped convince the three All-Stars to team up in Miami, one of the highlights of the season for both Miami and the NBA.

"The greatest thing in the history of South Florida sports was those guys coming together," Riley said. "With the exception of the (undefeated 1972) Dolphins. Maybe."

Shrek virus allows 'ugly' people to infiltrate dating site for the Beautiful



Things got a little ugly on beautifulpeople.com last month.

A virus called Shrek, named for the funny looking green monster of filmdom, allowed 30,000 "ugly" people into the exclusive site.

"We got suspicious when tens of thousands of new members were accepted over a six-week period, many of whom were no oil painting," Greg

Hodge, the managing editor of the website, said in a statement.

Typically, every applicant must pass a "rating" stage when existing members vote whether the applicants are beautiful enough to join. But when the virus took away the rating module, anyone was allowed access to the site. Soon enough, however, 30,000 new members, including 11,924 Americans, had been kicked off the website which boasts 700,000 members worldwide.

"Sorry to inform you, you're not beautiful enough," read the email one spurned applicant received. The applicant, a woman named Kate from Los Angeles, told the Huffington Post about her rejection.

To keep morale up, beautifulpeople.com has set up a hotline to help rejects deal with the let down and also offer tips about how to rejoin. An internal investigation is pointing to an angry reject or a former employee as the culprit. However, time will tell if this "ugly" breach is just a publicity stunt.

Last year, the website's public relations firm, Golden Goose PR, caused some controversy when they started an initiative called "Festive Fatties," where the website would kick off 5,000 users who appeared to have over-indulged during Christmastime.

The PR firm's aim there was "to provoke media attention with a controversial press release, to spark debate and enable the company founders to defend their brand and represent their core values, to attract more hits and applications.

The Difference Between Police Officers and Corrections Officers

If you've decided that you want a career in law enforcement, or if you are just interested in criminal justice, you might be wondering about the difference between police officers and corrections officers. These two

authority figures represent different areas of the criminal justice system, but each has an important and invaluable job in society. Of course, most people know what police officers are, and most people understand the jobs of corrections officers, but what is the difference?

Police officers are charged with serving and protecting the community at large, usually by patrolling the streets or by investigating crime. Corrections officers, on the other hand, are responsible for maintaining order in prisons, jails and detention facilities, which is an entirely different ballgame. Although they are required to protect inmates from harm, they are usually more concerned with meeting out punishment and enforcing the rules.

In many cases, corrections officers start their careers in prisons and jails, but decide later to become police officers instead. Working in a dark, smelly, depressing prison can be detrimental to life outside of work, and many corrections officers can't handle the stress after a few years. It is also a dangerous job, particularly in maximum-security facilities where the most violent offenders are kept. Police officers might be on the line of fire day after day, but their jobs are fairly mundane compared to those of corrections officers.

The major difference between the two careers is that police officers carry guns, while corrections officers are unarmed. This might seem like a miscarriage of justice and an unnecessary risk on the part of the officers, but in reality this rule keeps everyone safe. If a prison guard were to carry a gun on his or her hip, the chance that an inmate could gain access to it is simply too high to justify. Therefore, corrections officers can use only their hands and their radios as protection against attacks.

USA Job Growth Projections - Where will the Good Jobs Be?

The American job-generation machine rolls on. The country will create 19 million new payroll jobs in the decade to 2014, according to projections by the U.S. Department of Labor, more than one new job for every seven that now exist.

But that doesn't mean they will be evenly spread across the economy. So whether you are setting out on your career or looking to take the next step up the ladder, you need to know where the jobs will be if you want to take advantage. The fastest growth and largest increase in sheer numbers will be in professional



occupations like information technology specialists and teachers. Such jobs are forecast to grow by 6 million, or 21.2%.

Hard on their heels will be nurses, cooks, janitors and other services workers. Their numbers are projected to increase by 5.3 million, or 19%. Together, those two categories are expected to account for 41% of all jobs by 2014. up from 38.6% in 2004.

Management, business and financial occupations are also likely to see brisk growth. But they make up a relatively small slice of the employment market, just one job in ten. Their 14.4% growth rate translates into only

2.2 million new jobs. However, chief executives, who numbered 444,000 in 2004, are forecast to break through the 500,000 mark. One sign of the changing times: By 2014, America will have more chief execs than machine tool operators, the Labor Department reckons.

That's good news, too, for headhunters: Their numbers are forecast to increase by 30% to 237,000 from 182,000

At the other end of the scale, farming, fishing and forestry will continue to shrink, at least in terms of the number of people working in them. A forecast 1.3% decline will take such employment on the land and at sea to barely 1 million jobs, or 0.6% of the total workforce, down from 0.7% in 2004.

ARMED FORCES: SUCCESS IN RECRUITMENT?



The Department of Defense has announced its recruiting and retention statistics by the active and reserve components for the FY 2006 recruiting year.

Active duty recruiting. All services have met or exceeded their recruiting goals for fiscal 2006.

Active duty retention. Overall, the active duty services exceeded retention goals across the board. The Army, Air Force and Marine Corps exceeded fiscal 2006 retention goals in every category. The Navy retained in high numbers at the outset of the year, but a focus on physical fitness test performance led to an increase in disqualification among first-term sailors.

Reserve forces recruiting. Two of six Reserve components met or exceeded their accession goals for fiscal 2006, while two other Reserve components, the Army National Guard and the Air National Guard were close to making their end of year goals. Although the Army Reserve fell short of its annual accession goal, the U.S. Army Recruiting Command achieved 99+percent of its annual recruiting goal.

Reserve forces retention. Losses in all Reserve components were within acceptable limits. However, enlisted attrition through August 2006 is higher than the same period reported last year, but lower than the same period in the base year of fiscal 2000. The U.S. Naval Reserve presents a concern with its increasing attrition rates. We expect September 2006 to continue the current trend. (Note: This indicator lags by one month.)

Coast Guard. The Coast Guard is not included under the DOD statistics below (because the Coast Guard falls under the Department of Homeland Security), but the Coast Guard met its active duty recruiting goal for FY 2006, recruiting 3,992 enlisted members out of a goal of 3,950 (101%). However, the Coast Guard fell short of their Reserve goals, recruiting only 924 out of a goal of 1,390 (66%).

Pulitzer-winning journalist admits he's illegal immigrant



A Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist who covered the Virginia Tech massacre for the Washington Post went public Wednesday with a secret he has been keeping for nearly two decades: He is an illegal immigrant.

Jose Antonio Vargas tells ABC News in interviews airing Thursday and Friday that he is outing himself as one of millions of illegal U.S. immigrants after living with the secret for years. He also told his story in a New York Times Magazine essay published online Wednesday.

"I'm done running. I'm exhausted," Vargas wrote. "I don't want that life anymore." He says that now he wants to push Congress to

pass a bill called the DREAM Act that would allow people like him to become citizens if they go to college or serve in the military.

He referred a request for comment to his public relations team, which did not immediately make him available Wednesday.

When Vargas was 12 and living in the Philippines, his mother took him to the airport and sent him to California to live with his grandparents, he said. He didn't know about his citizenship status until four years later, when he applied for a driver's permit and handed a clerk his green card. "This is fake," a Department of Motor Vehicles clerk said, according to Vargas' account. "Don't come back here again."

Vargas confronted his grandfather, who acknowledged he purchased the green card and other fake documents. His grandfather imagined the fake documents would help Vargas get low-wage jobs. College seemed out of reach, until Vargas told Mountain View High School Principal Pat Hyland and school district Superintendent Rich Fisher about his problem. They became mentors and surrogate parents, eventually finding a scholarship fund for high-achieving students that allowed him to attend San Francisco State University.



V alt Disney was born on December 5, 1901 in Chicago Illinois,

to his father Elias Disney, and mother Flora Call Disney. Walt was one of five children, four boys and a girl.

Walt had very early interests in art, he would often sell drawings to neighbors to make extra money. He pursued his art career, by studying art and photography by going to McKinley High School in Chicago.

Walt joined the Red Cross and was sent overseas to France, where he spent a year driving an ambulance and chauffeuring Red Cross officials.

His ambulance was covered from stem to stern, not with stock camouflage, but with Disney cartoons. Once Walt returned from France, he began to pursue a career in commercial art. He started a small company called Laugh-O-Grams, which eventually fell bankrupt. With his suitcase, and twenty dollars, Walt headed to Hollywood to start anew. On December 21, 1937, *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs*, the first full-length animated musical feature, premiered at the Carthay Theater in Los Angeles. The film produced at the unheard cost of \$1,499,000 during the depths of the Depression, the film is still considered one of the great feats and imperishable monuments of the motion picture industry.

Walt Disney's dream of a clean, and organized amusement park, came true, as Disneyland Park opened in 1955. Walt Disney is a legend; a folk hero of the 20th century. His worldwide popularity was based upon the ideals which his name represents: imagination, optimism, creation, and self-made success in the American tradition.

Last Vietnam-era draftee decides to retire

FORT BELVOIR, Va. (AP) — A homemade wind chime with the word "Whining" under a red slash is made from metal parts put in his leg after a parachute accident. Every Sunday he trims his crew cut. He didn't join the Army willingly, but as Command Sgt. Maj. Jeff Mellinger prepares to retire, he's grateful he found his calling.



Mellinger was drafted to fight the Vietnam War, and the Army believes he's the last draftee to retire, after 39 years. Most did their two years and left. But Mellinger had found home.

Mellinger's motto is simple: No whining — as the wind chime attests.

When the draft notice arrived in the mail in 1972 at his home in Eugene, Ore., tens of thousands of troops had been killed. Anti-war protests were rampant. Draft notices were being set on fire and returning soldiers were treated as part of the problem. The military wasn't a popular job. The return address on the letter was the White House. Just 19, he was impressed that President Richard Nixon would write to him.

Nearly a decade later, he was sent to ground zero in New York right after the Sept. 11, 2001,



terrorist attacks as part of an advance party from the First Army. Then came his time in Iraq as the top enlisted soldier of the multi-national forces in Iraq, where he says he survived 27 roadside bombings during his deployment of nearly three years straight. Mellinger said he has a roster with the names of the 2,614 troops killed, the 19,304 wounded, and two missing in action from his time in Iraq. He wears a metal bracelet with those numbers sketched in it in their honor.

Wolfgang Puck



The name Wolfgang Puck is synonymous with the best of restaurant hospitality and the ultimate in all aspects of the culinary arts. The famous chef has built an empire that encompasses three separate Wolfgang Puck entities: Wolfgang Puck Fine Dining Group, Wolfgang Puck Catering, and Wolfgang Puck Worldwide, Inc.

Puck began cooking at his mother's side as a child. She was a chef in the Austrian town where he was born, and with her encouragement, Wolfgang began his formal training at fourteen years of age. As a young chef he

worked in some of France's greatest restaurants, including Maxim's in Paris, the Hotel de Paris in Monaco, and the Michelin 3-starred L'Oustau de Baumanière in Provence. At the age of 24, Wolfgang took the advice of a friend and left Europe for the United States. His first job was at the restaurant La Tour in Indianapolis, where he worked from 1973 to 1975.

Wolfgang came to Los Angeles in 1975 and very quickly garnered the attention of the Hollywood elite as chef and eventually part owner of Ma Maison in West Hollywood. His dynamic personality and culinary brilliance that bridged tradition and invention made Ma Maison a magnet for the rich and famous, with Wolfgang as the star attraction.

Biography of the author of the popular <u>Harry</u> <u>Potter</u> series of children's books, JK Rowling.

Ms. J K Rowling was born on July 31st, 1965 in Chipping Sodbury, Gloucestershire, England. Her given name at birth was Joanne Kathleen. Ms. Rowling has one sister, Di, who was born 2 years after J K.

It is interesting to note that Ms. Rowling claims that she has actually been writing since she was 5 or 6 years old. Her first story, called Rabbit, was filled with interesting characters, such as a large bee called Miss Bee.

Ms. Rowling, along with her parents and sister, moved twice while J K was growing up. While at one of their homes, close to Bristol and in Winterbourne, she had friends next door whose last name was Potter. J K never forgot the children, or the last name, which she liked very much.

When Ms. Rowling was 26 years old she moved to Portugal to be an English teacher. Ms. Rowling has been quoted many times as saying she loved teaching English, often teaching in the afternoons and evenings so that she could be free to work on her writing during the mornings. It was during this period that she began working on a story about a "wizard".

It was during this time that Ms. Rowling became determined to not only finish her Harry Potter "[~]wizard' novel, but to get it published. Often she would write in restaurants, where she and her daughter could stay warm while she wrote. Ms. Rowling requested a grant from the Scottish Arts Council, which she eventually received, in order to complete her book. When it was completed and after several rejections, Ms. Rowling sold the novel, Harry Potter and The Philosopher's Stone, to Bloomsbury in the UK for the equivalent of about \$4,000.

By the summer of 2000, Ms. Rowling had reportedly earned over \$400 million for her first three Harry Potter books, which have been printed in 35 languages and sold over 30 million copies. Her fourth book in the popular series, entitled Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire, pre-sold over one million advanced copies, with a first printing of 5.3 million. Because of her domination and incredible success on the New York Times bestseller list, the decision was made to introduce a bestseller list for children's books, which would eliminate the dominating factor of these bestsellers on the current The New York Times bestseller list. This brought a tremendous amount of relief and happiness to a lot of competing authors - and a tremendous honor to Ms. J K Rowling.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The space shuttle was sold to America as cheap, safe and reliable. It was none of those. It cost \$196 billion over 40 years, ended the lives of 14 astronauts and managed to make less than half the flights promised.

Yet despite all that, there were some big achievements that weren't promised: major scientific advances, stunning photos of the cosmos, a high-flying vehicle of diplomacy that helped bring Cold War enemies closer, and something to brag about.

Former President George H.W. Bush, who oversaw the early flights, said the shuttle program "authored a truly inspiring chapter in the history of human exploration."

The nation spent more on the space shuttle than the combined cost of soaring to the moon, creating the atom bomb, and digging the Panama Canal, according to an analysis by The Associated Press using figures from NASA and the Smithsonian Institution and adjusting for inflation. Of the five shuttles built, two were lost in fiery tragedies. The most shuttle flights taken in one year was nine — far from the promised 50.

The program also managed to make blasting into space seem everyday dull by going to the same place over and over again. Shuttles circled the planet 20,830 times, but went nowhere really new."The shuttle is an amazing piece of machinery," astronaut Stan Love said. "It blows away anything that can fly now or in the next 30 years."

However, when it comes to fulfilling the promise made four decades ago, Love retells a joke heard often around NASA: The space shuttle was supposed to be cheap, safe and turn spaceflight into something so routine it would be boring. One out of three ain't bad.

Study finds gene clues to African cattle disease

LONDON (Reuters) - Scientists studying the tsetse fly-borne disease "sleeping sickness" and a devastating version found in cattle say they have found two genes that may in future help rescue the livelihoods of millions of farmers in Africa.

In a study in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS) journal on Monday, the researchers said the genes should help cattle breeders identify animals that can resist the disease, as well as shedding more light on the human form, "African sleeping sickness," caused by the same parasite.

The World Health Organization estimates that around 30,000 Africans a year get sleeping sickness, although numbers have fallen sharply in the past decade due to better control measures. It is found in 36 sub-Saharan African nations and is caused by the trypanosome parasite which is transmitted by tsetse fly bites. Although the parasite is best known for sleeping sickness, which in its advanced stages causes sleep disturbance and can be fatal if left untreated, experts say its highest toll in terms of human welfare is from sick, wasting cattle and farming productivity losses. The annual economic impact of African animal trypanosomiasis, known locally as "nagana," a Zulu word meaning "to be depressed," has been estimated at \$4 to \$5 billion.

"Combined, the data were like a Venn diagram overlaying different sets of evidence (and) it was the overlap that interested us," Kemp said in a statement about the work.




The scientists said that with this new knowledge, breeders could screen African cattle to find animals with more disease resistance and seek to combine this genetic trait with other important traits like high productivity and drought tolerance. Using genetic engineering to achieve the same disease-resistant breeding herd -- an approach still in its early days -- may be done in four or five years, Kemp said.


Art imitates money (or vice versa) in U.S exhibit

Money and art have long been partners but never more so than in a new installation consisting entirely of \$1 bills on the walls of New York's Guggenheim museum.

The installation, which will be on display until November, features dollar bills blanketing nine walls in the famous museum -- exactly 100,000 of them.

The German-born artist Hans-Peter Feldmann came up with the idea after winning the money in the Hugo Boss Prize in 2010.

"The installation, which uses money that has previously been in circulation, extends the artist's lifelong obsession with collecting familiar material into simple groupings that reveal a <u>nuanced</u> play of similarity and difference," according to assistant curator Katherine Brinson.

Pediatricians Rip Media for Increasing Childhood Obesity

The American Academy of Pediatrics has taken aim at the media saying television ads for sugary and fatty foods are playing a role in the childhood obesity epidemic in a new policy statement.

The AAP listed multiple ways television is contributing to obesity in children including: increased sedentary activity; unhealthy eating practices learned from programming and advertisements; increased snacking while watching TV; and interference with normal sleep patterns.

The AAP found that drinking a can of soda per day produces a weight gain of 15 pounds per year and that almost 40 percent of a child's caloric intake comes from solid fat and added sugars. Sugars and soda or fruit drinks provide 10 percent of the calories. The report from the AAP also noted that 98 percent of food ads seen by children aged 2-11 and nearly 90 percent of food ads seen by teenagers are for products that are high in fat, sugar, and sodium or are juple.

are high in fat, sugar, and sodium or are junk food.

The AAP said pediatricians should ask parents about how much time their child spends with screen media, including computers and is there a TV set or unrestricted computer access in the child's bedroom as a start to stopping obesity.

In addition, pediatricians will recommend no more than 2 hours a day and avoid putting TV's or internet connections in their child's room. But the most potentially damaging recommendation



from the AAP policy is to ask Congress, the Federal Trade Commission, and the Federal Communications Commission to implement a ban on junk-food advertising during programming that is viewed by children. That would directly impact the costs incurred by the fast-food industry, which spent \$4.2 billion on advertising in all media in 2009.
